


Chairman's Report

Region Winter Fair. I am delighted to welcome an increased number of Breed Society stands this year and you will find hill, longwool and terminal sire breeds represented. Once again there is a wide range of trade stands, both inside and outside the market, including newcomers to our event.

The Central Region is particularly keen to support and encourage young people into the sheep industry and we are pleased to be holding three competitions once more, covering different age groups: the Schools Wool Challenge for Years 8 & 9; the Inter-Schools Junior Shepherd Competition co-ordinated by DART, for 16-18 year olds; and the Young Shepherd Competition for those up to age 26, organized by Matt Bagley from Reaseheath College.

elcome to Bakewell Market the Regional Centre for Sheep Sales in the Peak District.

It is now 15 years since the "New" Bakewell Market or Agricultural Business Centre (A.B.C) was opened by Her Royal Highness Princess Anne.

The siting and design were controversial to say the least and opinions were divided within the town most particularly in regard to the "tented" roof over the sheep pens.

Some suggested that it would be a white elephant and that following BSE livestock markets were doomed, and of course during the 2001 Foot and Mouth outbreak no livestock were sold for almost 12 months. At least no livestock that were on the premises. There were the "photographic" auctions which ran for a few months prior to reopening in Spring 2002.

Even without livestock the opportunity for farmers to gather together was appreciated after the long break when it was not permitted.

There was a small hiccough in 2007 when the FMD virus escaped from Pirbright twice and on the second occasion in September of that year the national shutdown coincided with a large Store lamb sale.

Bakewell found itself on the National and International News with 12,000 lambs trapped in the market awaiting Defra's permission to travel.



The last 3 years have brought with them a much awaited boost in livestock values and a new found enthusiasm amongst livestock farmers as their efforts have become better appreciated on the back of fears about food security.

So in a very short space of time since opening

much has happened in the livestock marketing world, but despite all this there are plenty of sheep and cattle to be found at Bakewell, but no sign of any white elephants.



WINTER FAIR 2013

Liver Fluke

Prevalence, diagnosis and treatment

he UK cattle and sheep industry is worth over £3 billion a year at the farmgate¹. However, both species are vulnerable to infection by liver fluke (Fasciola hepatica)

- and millions of pounds can be lost each year.
- National flock £5.28 million lost per year²
- National herd £23 million lost per year³

Prevalence of fluke

Liver fluke are now found throughout the UK, even in those previously less affected areas such as East Anglia and south east Scotland. Recent changes in weather patterns have affected the prevalence of fluke as both the fluke parasite and its snail host thrives in wet, warm conditions. Increasingly wet summers mean that experts are predicting heavy fluke challenges.

On average, 1.34 million sheep and cattle livers are condemned per year⁴ and many producers are now receiving slaughter reports of infected stock for the first time.

Lifecycle of fluke

Liver fluke have two phases, inside and outside the animal – increasing their potential to infect. Inside the animal, the liver fluke matures through three growth stages – early immature, immature and adult – the first two stages cause damage to the liver as they migrate towards the bile duct. The adult stages are blood suckers and can lay

up to 50,000 eggs per day in the bile duct which are consequently passed out onto pasture and can increase the likelihood of reinfection and infection in other animals.

The snail host hibernates when the ground temperature drops below 10°C, and the larvae inside will overwinter, starting to develop again only when the temperature is right for the snail. This is called the winter infection of snails and these larvae can cause fluke disease early in the summer. The biggest infection of snails happens in the summer, which is why we have the biggest risk of fluke infection in the autumn. Due to the weather being milder and wetter, fluke disease in some areas is now becoming a year-round problem.

Can we be sure it is fluke?

To avoid on-going production losses, farmers should be aware of symptoms and seek an early, accurate diagnosis. Faecal egg counts can be used to detect the presence of fluke. Consult with your vet for diagnosis and advice on your own farm.

Flukicide options

Preventative measures can be taken against fluke, including draining marshy land to reduce the snail habitat or fencing such areas to prevent animals from grazing on it. For the majority of farmers, flukicide treatments are essential to protect flock health and optimize productivity.

The most effective option is a treatment containing triclabenzadole that kills fluke at the earliest growth stage in the liver to prevent liver damage and kill fluke before they lay eggs. Flukicides that don't kill all three stages, and leave immature stages alive and able to develop into egg laying adults, will require a further treatment, in the meantime exposing the animal to further liver damage. In sheep, triclabenzadole kills all 3 stages of fluke down to 2 days of age and has been shown to deliver a 3kg higher weight gain than treating for adult fluke only⁵. The fluke challenge in the autumn of 2012 has been very heavy and traditional treatment times may not be adequate. None of the flukicides are persistent so animals will get reinfected when they start grazing pasture again. It is important to discuss the treatment strategy on your farm with your prescriber,

Early immature fluke

1 - 5 weeks

- Early immature fluke tunnel through the liver severing blood vessels and destroying liver cells
- Loss of liver function, anaemia and even death can occur.
- Damage continues unless early immature flukes are eliminated by a flukicide that kills all stages of fluke.



Immature fluke


6 - 9 weeks

- Unless killed, second stage immature fluke continue tunneling towards the bile duct.
- Further liver damage can severely compromise animal health and productivity.



Adult fluke 10 - 12 weeks

- On reaching the bile duct, third stage adult fluke lay up to 50,000 eggs per day.
- Damage to the bile duct, and feeding on blood, leads to poor condition, anaemia and bottle jaw.
